A MESSAGE FROM THE CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN:

Consider our contradictory attitudes toward death. Our society at one moment threatens euthanasia and the next refuses to allow people simply to die, prolonging vital functions when there is no longer any possibility of living humanly.

Our fear of death is such that we carefully never use the word, yet every night in living color we bring into view scenes of violence, death, destruction and seem always to crave more.

We inflict death on one another in war, mass murders, street violence, family fights, and yet can go to great extremes to deny death's reality.

People, who while living never used cosmetics, are powdered and painted when dead to look alive, ready to awaken at any moment. People pay tremendous amounts to have dead relatives quick-frozen, so that in some future time they can be resuscitated. We avoid speaking of death to terminally ill persons who need to talk. We whisk children away from dying parents and grandparents, leaving them confused, to grieve alone, because we don't know what to say to them.

We who believe in the resurrection of Jesus and the promise of our own resurrection live surrounded by people who have no religious belief to give validity to the powerful unconscious belief that they themselves cannot die.

Jesus speaks of his death not in terms of fear or denial. He plainly says that what looks like destruction of the person, the end of being, is in reality the way and only way to new and greater being.

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT:

I have received several reports from inmates, staff and volunteers regarding the behavior of restricted inmates who are attending Bible study and A.A. groups in the evenings. The volunteers who come in from the community to conduct these groups do so on their own time, without payment, to provide a service to the women of OWCC who are truly interested in learning something of value. They do not present these programs simply for restricted inmates to get additional time out of their rooms. Many non-restricted inmates have stopped attending these groups because of the discourteous behavior of restricted inmates who use the group time for social conversation.

It is clear to me that restricted inmates are abusing the privileges that have been extended to them and are disadvantaging the interests of the majority, as well as the volunteer instructors. Therefore, effective immediately, restricted inmates will no longer be permitted to attend Bible study and A.A. groups conducted by volunteers. Restricted inmates will still be authorized to attend religious services and receive one-on-one and/or group counselling conducted by contract or Mental Health Division staff.

The following was submitted to the Management Insight (a State of Oregon publication) by Linda K. Davis, of the Oregon State Parks Department:

To laugh is to risk appearing the fool.
To weep is to risk appearing sentimental.
To reach for another is to risk involvement.
To expose feelings is to risk exposing our true self.
To place your idea, your dreams before the crowd is to risk loss.
To love is to risk not being loved in return.
To live is to risk dying.
To hope is to risk despair.
To try at all is to risk failure.
But to risk we must . . . Because . . .
The greatest hazard in life is to risk nothing.
The man, the woman, who risks nothing, does nothing, has nothing, is nothing.


