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Employment in Tillamook County: January 2024

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 90 in January

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 90 in January to 9,600 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 140 jobs, and the county lost 230 jobs. The private sector lost 200 jobs, and total government employment decreased by 30. Leisure and hospitality lost 140 jobs. Local government lost 40 jobs.

January's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 20 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 0.2%. Private education and health services gained 50 jobs over the past year to January. Manufacturing added 40 jobs. Accommodation and food services lost 70 jobs during the year. Government gained 10 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.8% in January, essentially unchanged from 3.7% in December. It was 5.0% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.1% in January, and the national rate was 3.7%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
