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## **Employment in Clatsop County: March 2019**

### **Employment Rose by 90 more than Expected in March**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 90 jobs in March to 19,000 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 120 jobs was expected for the month, but the county added 210 jobs. The private sector grew by 230 jobs, and total government employment decreased by 20. Leisure and hospitality gained 190 jobs. Trade, transportation, and utilities grew by 30. Local government education shed 40 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

March's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 180 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 1.0 percent. The industries changing the most over the year were retail trade (+200 jobs) and leisure and hospitality (+90 jobs).

Clatsop County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.5 percent in March, essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.6%) but slightly higher than the year before (4.1%). The county's rate was also about the same as the statewide rate (4.4%) but slightly higher than the national rate (3.8%).

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
