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## **Employment in Tillamook County: April 2019**

### **Employment Fell by 60 more than Expected in April**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment fell by 60 in April to 9,450 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 220 jobs was expected for the month, but the county added only 160. Total private-sector employment added 150 jobs, and government employment inched up by 10. Leisure and hospitality added 100 jobs and food manufacturing chipped in 30 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

April's total nonfarm employment was 200 more than one year before, a gain of 2.2 percent. The private sector added 150 jobs over the year, and government gained 50 jobs. Food manufacturing added 220 jobs over the year, and leisure and hospitality grew by 100 jobs. Professional and business services lost 80 jobs, and retail trade was down 40 jobs. Local government grew by 40 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.4 percent in April, essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.6%) and the year before (4.3%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.3%) but above the national rate (3.6%).

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
