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Employment in Linn County (Albany MSA): October 2019

Linn County's Unemployment Rate at 4.7 Percent

Linn County's unemployment rate remained at 4.7 percent in October, unchanged from its revised September rate of 4.7 percent. Oregon's statewide rate in October was 4.1 percent, unchanged from its revised rate of 4.1 percent in September. Linn County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate nearly matches its rate from a year ago of 4.8 percent in October 2018.

Linn County's employment gains in October were larger than normal; total nonfarm employment increased 660 jobs, when an increase of roughly 510 jobs would be expected. The difference resulted in a 150-job seasonally adjusted increase between September and October. Linn County's employment is 3,250 jobs or 7.5 percent above its pre-recession employment peak in February 2008.

Linn County's employment has grown 590 over the past year, a 1.3 percent increase. The growth rate was similar to the nation and the state. Oregon's job growth over the past year was 1.4 percent and the U.S. also grew 1.4 percent.

Linn County's private sector added 290 jobs over the past year, growing 0.7 percent. The public sector added 300 jobs, up 4.3 percent.

Fast-growing private-sector industries over the past year included: information (+30 jobs, or 8.1%); construction (+210 jobs, or 6.5%); and manufacturing (+350 jobs, or 4.1%).

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Official Oregon Series. Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
