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Employment in Tillamook County: January 2022

Seasonally adjusted employment fell by 70 in January

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 70 in January to 9,160 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to fall by 130 jobs, but the county lost 200 jobs. The private sector shed 190 jobs, and government employment fell by 10. Leisure and hospitality shed 70 jobs. Mining and logging cut 60 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

January's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 270 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 3.1%. The county lost 1,370 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remains 410 jobs below its pre-pandemic employment of January 2019. Most major industries gained jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality and retail trade each added 100 jobs. Other services recovered 80 jobs. Manufacturing added back 60 jobs. Local government regained 120 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.2% in January, essentially unchanged from 4.3% in December. It was 7.2% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.3% in January, and the national rate was 4.0%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
